SAMPLE POSTS FOR CLEAN & RESILIENT WATERS:

- One flush of untreated sewage is estimated to contain the same amount of bacteria as 10,000 flushes of sewage processed by a treatment plant. If you own a boat, please pumpout your blackwater and help keep Maine waters sewage free. [#LoveMaineWaters](#)
- One way we can show we [#LoveMaineWaters](#) is by leaving no trace. Taking an extra moment to make sure we pick up our trash at the beach or to secure all of our gear before disembarking on our boats are simple measures that make a difference.

SAMPLE POSTS FOR INLAND WATERS:

- Watch your wake. Headway speed only within 200 feet of any freshwater shore. Excessive wakes erode shorelines and can damage loon nests. [#LoveMaineWaters](#)
- Entangled fishing lines can hurt wildlife. Be prepared to retrieve your line or failed cast. [#LoveMaineWaters](#)
- Always clean, drain and dry your vessel, fishing gear, decoys, and water sports gear before and after use. Treat every water body as if it could have aquatic invasive species that you can't see and don't want to spread elsewhere. [#LoveMaineWaters](#)
